Crime Reduction Act

- ❖ Updated in FY2023 to add purpose areas and additional \$2m
- ❖ Allocated to date: \$1.68m
- ❖ Available in second round: **\$650K**
- ❖ **Half** year funding

2020 New Mexico Statutes
Chapter 31 - Criminal Procedure
Article 28 - Crime Reduction Grant
Section 31-28-4 - Applications for grants; purposes;
conditions.

Universal Citation: NM Stat § 31-28-4 (2020)

A. A member of a criminal justice coordinating council with the consent of the council may apply to a grant administration agency for a grant to accomplish any of the enumerated purposes provided in Subsection B of this section.

B. Crime reduction grants may be made to:

- (1) develop, expand and improve evidence-based treatment and supervision alternatives to incarceration;
- (2) reduce barriers to participation by criminal offenders in preprosecution diversion or specialty court programs;

CJCC Requirements



- ❖ 1. Grantee agencies/programs must be a part of a CJCC or sponsored by a member.
- ❖ Regular member/partner(s): Police, Courts, Service Providers, Public Defense, etc.
- ❖ 2. Approve proposal





Grantee Requirements

- ❖ 1. Quarterly and final reports
- ❖ 2. Submit invoices monthly
- ❖ 3. Share data and evaluation results
- ❖ 4. Participate in an in-person or virtual site visit

Overview

The Results First Clearinghouse Database contains information from nine clearinghouses that rate programs in social policy areas such as behavioral health, criminal justice, education, and public health, based on the findings of rigorous evaluations.

Beyond the sources included in this database, many additional publicly available resources provide information on the effectiveness of programs and practices in different formats and based on a variety of research types. Some of them are updated on a regular basis like the Clearinghouse Database; others are static publications about specific programs or topics.

The following is a compilation of national and international resources that highlight the efficacy of programs and practices. They are organized under broad themes based on their primary area of focus.

Functional Family Therapy (FFT) serves youth with delinquency, violence, or substance at the juvenile justice system, and their families¹. FFT focuses on strengths, challenges, protect clients and their family systems. Through an average of 12 sessions, therapists establish family members, motivate clients, explore family dynamics, work to change behavior patterns, relapse plans and links to community resources².

Expected Beneficial Outcomes (Rated)



Pew Trusts Results First	Program Efficacy	A quick way to find articles on the effectiveness of a project and identify model programs. Dig deeper by clicking through footnotes to reach relevant academic research. A great place to start!
National Institutes of Justice	Academic Program Efficacy Studies	Wide ranging resource for criminal justice research. Publications generally tend to the data heavy, academic side.
Council of State Governments	Less Academic Program Information	General clearinghouse from a state level. A lot of information about best practices around the country.
National Drug Court Institute	Drugs	Provides best practices for drug courts. Operating drug courts may be able to make use of their training programs.
Partners for Justice	Courts	Partners with public defenders to provide non-lawyer advocates. Advocates connect to other social services available to clients and serve as legal navigators.

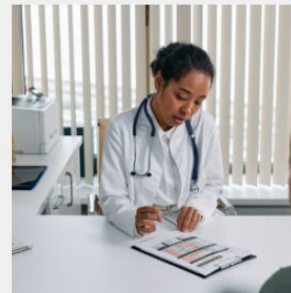

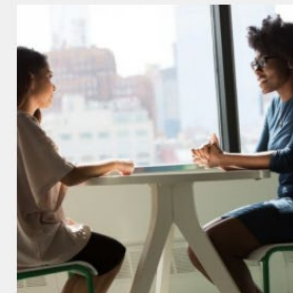

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Crime Reduction Grants

The Grants Committee of the New Mexico Sentencing Commission will be awarding funds for multiple Crime Reduction Grants during Round 2 of Grant Funding for Fiscal Year 2023. Project applications will be accepted through October 28, 2022. These grants will be for half-year funding.

Projects receiving grants should plan to use all funds between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2023.

- Eligible programs should advance one of the following goals:
 - Develop, expand and improve evidence-based treatment and supervision alternatives to incarceration;
 - Reduce barriers to participation by criminal offenders in preprosecution diversion or specialty court programs;
