capacity magazine" is really the standard magazine for most firearms these days, as 10 rounds is the standard magazine capacity; the bill is likely untenable under the 2nd Amendment; last year the ban was 15-round capacity, and now it is down to

10. DPS added than many bills are putting the onus of distributing funds on DPS, when that is really a DFA function;

DPS does not have the manpower to distribute funds.

Additionally, DPS added that it is unclear what the appropriation attached to this bill is intended to accomplish or support, and that the re-sale mechanism in some bills is not functional as firearms dealers do not have the capacity to sell the stock they have, or cannot use the weapons that people bring to them for sale. AODA noted that it would be a problem to enforce this bill as almost every handgun has that capacity. The committee voted not to support this legislation, due to the concerns expressed by

DPS, by a vote of 10-0.

assessment, but it was not clear what that meant: finally, there was a concern with annual adjustments to public safety assessments used in judicial districts as the districts likely would not have large enough sample sizes, and validations of public safety assessments take years. AODA questioned whether the bill was adding anything to the present process. Magistrate Judge added that it seemed that this was a backdoor way to a rebuttable presumption. LOPD noted that while there were issues with the Arnold tool and how it is applied, the procedures in the bill to address those problems confuses the science; additionally, the bill tasks the CJCCs and the NMSC with tasks that they are not set up to operate.

Magistrate Judge noted that the higher qualifications were to get individuals on the bench who were better able to understand the gravity of the position. LOPD noted there was a tension between the

still being elected on a county level.
