

## Crime Reduction Grants Awarded for FY2025 by Target Population

### Public Safety

#### **1st JD: CJCC Director (24-27, 1<sup>st</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding to hire a Criminal Justice Coordinating Council Director to serve the First Judicial District CJCC.

#### **2<sup>nd</sup> JD: BCSO Data-Driven Policing Project (25-08, Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office)**

Provides funding to purchase specialized laptops, tablets, high-resolution monitors, and fingerprint scanners to support the Crime Analysis Unit's operations. The grant also supports training for personnel and the conversion of an existing van into a mobile forensic laboratory.

#### **5th JD: LOPD Recruitment (24-32, Law Offices of the Public Defender)**

Provides funding for recruitment bonuses for attorneys hired by the Law Offices of the Public Defender with the goal of fully staffing that office so that cases can be adjudicated in a timely manner.

#### **5<sup>th</sup> JD: 5<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Attorney – Evidence Portal (25-14, 5<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Attorney)**

Provides funding for a one-year purchase agreement for installation and implementation of the NICE Digital Evidence Systems. The grant will coordinate of Lea, Eddy, and Chavez counties to share digital evidence.

#### **6<sup>th</sup> JD: Court Security Active Shooter Training (25-17, Luna County)**

Provides funding for purchase and training for virtual reality equipment and software, focusing on intervention and de-escalation techniques for community members.

#### **8th JD: Justice Premier (24-19.2, 8<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding to purchase a new platform for discovery retention and distribution across agencies (law enforcement, public defenders, court, DAs office), as well as for training on the implementation of the program.

#### **9th JD: LOPD Recruitment (24-35, Law Offices of the Public Defender)**

Provides funding for recruitment bonuses for attorneys hired by the Law Offices of the Public Defender with the goal of fully staffing that office so that cases can be adjudicated in a timely manner.

### At-Risk

#### **2nd JD: BCSO Community Assistance and Support Team (24-4.2, Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office)**

Provides funding for Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office to create a Community Assistance and Supports Team (CAST) that will expand its social work and victim advocacy efforts.

#### **2nd JD: Bernalillo County Warrant Forgiveness Walk-In Program (25-01, Law Offices of the Public Defender)**

Provides funding for advertising, equipment, and refreshments for a series of events in which defendants can re-engage with the criminal justice system to resolve their cases, potentially through negotiating please or prosecutorial diversion.

#### **5<sup>th</sup> JD: Pathways to Recovery (25-15, Community Drug Coalition of Lea County)**

Provides funding for a Certified Peer Support Specialist, Group Therapist, and Individual Counselor to provide Intensive Outpatient Programs for clients struggling with addiction.

#### **6<sup>th</sup> JD: Hidalgo County Community Response Team (25-03, County of Hidalgo)**

Provides funding for a Contract Project Manager to coordinate Crisis Intervention training for professionals and to partner with community organizations. The grant also provides direct services for clients such as travel and grocery vouchers, mileage reimbursements, and per diem client errands.

**13th JD: Resource Assessment Center (24-26, 13<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for a Resource Assessment Center for those 18 and older who have had police contact or are considered at-risk of police contact. The Center is focused on decreasing contact with law enforcement by assessing clients' needs and strengths and providing case management services.

**Pretrial****1st JD: Pretrial Peer Support (24-2.2, Pretrial Peer Support)**

Provides funding to hire a certified peer support worker to assist individuals charged with a criminal offense in the district court in complying with conditions of release.

**2nd JD: Resource Reentry Center (24-09, Law Offices of the Public Defender)**

Provides funding to staff a Resource Reentry Center as a first stop for individuals who are released from custody where they have access to case management, transition plans, and transportation.

**4th JD: Pretrial Release Support (24-15, 4<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding to continue providing Global Positioning Services (GPS) equipment at no cost to defendants released on Pretrial Services.

**5th JD: Transportation for Criminal Defendants (24-17.2, 5<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for transportation for pretrial defendants who lack transportation to ensure that they can appear for court and pretrial appointments and remain in compliance with their conditions of release.

**8<sup>th</sup> JD: Taos Pre-Adjudication Support (25-18, DreamTree Project)**

Provides funding for a pilot project designed to support coordination between the justice system and behavior health providers, connecting arrested individuals with services they need.

**11th JD: San Juan & McKinley Counties Pretrial Transportation Services (24-23.2, 11<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for bus passes for pretrial defendants who lack transportation to ensure that they can appear for court and pretrial appointments and remain in compliance with their conditions of release.

**Pre-Prosecution Diversion****2nd JD: Diversion Program (24-08, 2<sup>nd</sup> JD Attorney's Office)**

Provides funding for removing low level offenders from the criminal justice system and placing them into treatment and rehabilitation services through the DA's Pre-Prosecution Diversion (PPD) program or Specialty Courts.

**2nd JD: Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Program (24-30, 2<sup>nd</sup> JD Attorney's Office)**

Provides funding for the DA's office to develop and run a diversion program for non-violent gun-related offenses and implement intervention tactics to reduce and prevent gun violence, increase public safety, and reduce recidivism.

**8<sup>th</sup> JD: Taos LEAD (25-04, DreamTree Project)**

Provides funding for a Project Manager to oversee LEAD—develop information sharing systems, train personnel in the program, and facilitate meetings amongst stakeholders and the community. The grant also supports two Case Managers to provide intensive case management to participants as well as a Clinical Supervisor to provide support and oversight.

**Treatment Court****2nd JD: Mental Health Court Program (24-05.2, 2<sup>nd</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for a pre- and post-plea diversion treatment court program that is designed specifically for individuals whose involvement with the justice system is directly related to an untreated or un-stabilized mental health disorder.

**2nd JD: Lease of Remote Alcohol Monitoring Devices (24-06, Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court)**

Provides funding for the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court to lease Remote Alcohol Monitoring Devices (SCRAM/CAM) and use a Transdermal 24/7 alcohol monitoring agency for these devices.

**2nd JD: Alternative Treatment Enhancement Services (24-07, Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court)**

Provides funding for the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court to contract with community treatment providers for alternative enhancement treatment options for the participants of its Specialty Court Programs.

**2nd JD: Incentives Specialty Court Treatment Programs (25-11, Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court)**

Provides funding for incentives for participants in Specialty Courts and Behavioral Health Division Programs, such as gift cards or tokens, as well as supplies for graduation and recovery ceremonies.

**3rd JD: District Court Treatment Programs (24-11, 3rd JD Court)**

Provides funding for specialty programs that handle cases involving offenders who suffer from mental health disorders, substance dependence, and possess high prognostic risk and criminogenic needs.

**4th JD: Behavioral Health Court and Healthcare Manager (24-12, 4<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding to establish a behavioral health specialty court program under the auspices of the Fourth Judicial District Court with the assistance of contracted service providers, as well as to improve the District's two existing addiction treatment courts.

**4th JD: 4<sup>th</sup> JD Treatment Court Training (25-13, 4<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for travel to training for staff and judges of the treatment court programs in the Judicial District.

**5th JD: Chaves Adult Treatment Court Program (24-16, 5<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for the Chaves County Adult Treatment Court Program to provide incentives as a reward for the participants to assist them becoming more engaged in the program requirements and in turn provide better outcomes within their individual and social environments.

**6th JD: Day Habilitation Support Services (24-18.2, Hidalgo County)**

Provides funding to support enhanced Day Habilitation services for drug court and other clients with substance use disorders and/or mental health disorders who commit low level or petty misdemeanor offenses.

**6<sup>th</sup>JD: Treatment Court Incentives (25-16, 6<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court)**

Provides funding for incentives in the form of gift cards or gift certificates for drug court participants to assist with completing milestones and achieving graduation.

**8th JD: Family Violence (FV) Treatment Court (24-20, 8<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding to continue the existing FV Treatment Court, which connects individuals charged and/or convicted of FV offenses to therapeutic services, including Batterer's Intervention groups, case management, and substance use disorder treatment.

**11th JD: Alumni and Peer Support for Adult Problem-Solving Court Programs (24-22.2, 11<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for expanding the Alumni Support and Peer Support Program for the Adult Drug Court, Mental Health Court, and DWI Court.

**12th JD: Young Adult Court (24-36, 12<sup>th</sup> JD Court)**

Provides funding for treatment and social services for individuals aged 18 to 25 who have pending felony charges at the Twelfth District Court.

## Incarcerated

### **13<sup>th</sup> JD: Valencia County Detention Center Radios (25-19, Valencia County)**

Provides funding for dual band radios for use by detention officers at the Valencia County Adult Detention Center and installation of wireless access points. This wireless broadband expansion project will enhance detainees' access to educational opportunities, telehealth services, rehabilitation, and family and community connections.

## Probation and Parole

### **2nd JD: Probation Division Specialized Training (25-10, Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court)**

Provides funding for registration and travel expenses for probation division staff, managers, administrators, and judges to attend the Winter Training Institute in Las Vegas, Nevada, and for attendees to present lessons learned to staff unable to attend.

## Re-Entry

### **2nd JD: Housing Vouchers (24-28, Bernalillo County/ Gordon Bernell Charter School)**

Provides funding for housing vouchers for adult students of the Gordon Bernell Charter School who are being released from the Metropolitan Detention Center and who comply with program requirements.

### **3<sup>rd</sup> JD: (De)Serving Life Reentry Project (25-12, (De)Serving Life Reentry Services)**

Provides funding for a Reentry Coordinator to serve up to 25 clients released on parole to address wide-ranging needs, such as housing, consumer rights, family law, employment, government benefits, health, and disability rights.

### **8th JD: Krossroads Training, Equipment, and Coordinator (24-34, Krossroads Integrative Health and Recovery Solutions, Inc.)**

Provides funding for staff training and the purchase of basic vital signs equipment, as well as to hire a Pretrial Services and Transitional Housing Coordinator.

### **11<sup>th</sup> JD: San Juan County Reentry Support (25-06, San Juan County)**

Provides funding for a case manager to provide personalized reentry plan and post-release support for incarcerated individuals as well as assistance with transportation, housing, and access to healthcare and workforce services.

### **13<sup>th</sup> JD: Valencia Medicated Assisted Treatment (25-07, Valencia County)**

Provides funding for a part-time case manager to assist with reentry and discharge planning for inmates who have been accepted into the VMAT program within the jail. The grant also provides funding for recruitment and retention of Valencia County Detention Center staff as well as computer devices for the VMAT program.

## Definitions: Nine Target Populations

**Public Safety:** Grants that support broad public or justice agency initiatives with no defined beneficiary. Example grants include data-sharing and public outreach initiatives. Public outreach initiatives correspond with SIMS Intercept 0.

**At-Risk:** Grants that support prevention or diversion activities targeted to individuals that are not currently justice-involved (have no open cases and are not on probation or parole). Example grants include pre-file diversion programs, training staff in crisis intervention, and funds to hire law enforcement. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercepts 0 or 1.)

**Pretrial:** Defendants who have been released on bail, their own recognizance, or on pretrial supervision after a criminal court case has been filed against them, rather than being incarcerated while awaiting trial. Pretrial defendants must abide by conditions established by the court and must report to pretrial services. Example grants include bus passes and therapy programs for pretrial defendants, as well as funds to hire prosecutors and public defenders. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 2.)

**Pre-Prosecution Diversion:** In exchange for a defendant's agreement to participate in a pre-prosecution diversion program, the prosecutor has requested the court suspend/temporarily dismiss prosecution. The prosecutor may elect to re-open the case if the defendant commits a new crime or otherwise does not comply with the terms of the pre-prosecution diversion program (Section 31-16A-7 NMSA 1978). Example grants include funding for portions of the pre-prosecutive diversion program, such as monitoring or therapy. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 2.)

**Treatment Courts:** Pre- and/or post-plea defendants participating in treatment (specialty) courts that are overseen by the New Mexico Department for Therapeutic Justice. New Mexico has drug courts, behavioral health courts, family violence courts, and other treatment courts, depending on the JD. Defendants are not considered to be on probation, nor are they participating in a diversion program. Participants' cases may be re-adjudicated if the defendant does not successfully complete treatment court requirements. CRGA grants may cover the entire cost of some small treatment courts, but more typically cover components of a treatment court, such as the purchase of incentives or training for professionals who work with participants. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 3.)

**Incarcerated:** Defendants in custody either pre-trial or after prosecution. Examples include programs to purchase computers for currently incarcerated offenders to complete online treatment programs. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 3.)

**Re-Entry:** Examples include transition housing and supply pantries for people who have recently completed a jail or prison sentence. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 4.)

**Probation and Parole:** Some therapeutic programs have been made available to individuals on probation or parole (i.e. community corrections). Often, the programs also serve people in treatment courts, and possibly at-risk individuals as well. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercepts 3, 4 and 5.)

**Competency:** These individuals were found to be incompetent for purposes of adjudication. Example grants include providing training for treatment guardians. (This population corresponds with SIMS Intercept 5.)
