The public member also voiced concern about House Bill 116's proposition that a court may preclude individuals convicted of human trafficking from being eligible for meritorious deductions; the member felt that NMCD ought to maintain autonomy over determining meritorious deductions, as those deductions can be a powerful motivator for good behavior during incarceration. On a motion from DPS, seconded by NMCD, the Committee voted to support this bill on a divided vote, with 5 voting to support (the Chair, the Juvenile Committee Chair, AODA, DPS, and NMCD), 3 against supporting (all public members), and two abstentions (the Magistrate Judge and one public member).
